Year 11 Geography Field Visit to Flamborough Head



Year 11 geographers took a trip to the North Yorkshire coast to prepare for their upcoming exams. It was a great day packed with lots of activities. The students received expert tutorage from professional field study staff who specialise in outdoor fieldwork.

The students started the day analysing the coastal processes taking place along the dramatic coastline and looked for evidence of these features in the landscape. They even saw some seals who were clearly enjoying relaxing on this stunning coastline! They headed on a short cliff walk and took in the scenery and sketched the processes they could visibly see happening in front of them. After heading back from the exposed cliff tops they donned their helmets and headed down to Selwicks Bay. Here they found some shelter which proved a welcome relief from the exposed cliff tops.

Students were given the opportunity to work with a variety of fieldwork equipment and learnt how to carry out beach profiles, surveys and sediment sampling. They then assessed the effectiveness of their methodologies and justified their techniques. After an exhilarating climb back towards the lighthouse they had another chance to take in the dramatic scenery





King Edward VII holds Climate Fortnight

Starting on Monday 28 February 2022, King Edward VII launched its first Climate Fortnight event. This was led by Eco Schools lead teacher, Mr Johnston, in conjunction with English teacher, Mr Lallemand.

This involved subject areas across the curriculum coming up with a climate



change themed lesson for each Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9 class. Mathematics teachers got students studying the graphs and statistics about the carbon emissions of different food types, with students then examining their own food choices in this light. English teachers got students writing their own poems on the theme of climate change and the natural world. In Modern Foreign Languages students had the opportunity to create their own poster on an environmental theme, using the language they are being taught. In Drama students looked at the issue of care of land and the natural environment, considering this through looking at the difference between ideas of 'ownership' or knowledge about how to care for land, through the play 'The Caucasian Chalk Circle' by Bertolt Brecht.

The Climate Fortnight tied in with this year's online conference provided by the Schools Climate Education South Yorkshire. Teachers were able to access pre-recorded and live video content with students in their classes on the following topics:

One of the highlights of Climate Fortnight for King Edward VII School students was the opportunity to put questions to **Sheffield MP**, **Louise Haigh**, based on training by 'Hope for the Future' on how to engage effectively with MPs.



Students recognised that Louise Haigh, as Shadow Transport Minister, has a particular interest in this subject. So questions were asked, such as:

How do you think we can make train travel cheaper and more affordable, so people are not forced to choose to travel by car?

How do you think Sheffield people can be encouraged to make more use of public transport?

Questions were also asked in relation to the links between climate and equality issues, such as:

What can the government do to help make things such as vegan food and electric vehicles more affordable for less well off people in Sheffield?

Some questions addressed the international panel on Climate Change UN body, such as this from a Year 10 student at King Edward VII School:

What are your thoughts about what our government should do in response to the most recent IPCC report?

Many students want their schools to be managed with closer attention to sustainability issues, so questions were raised, such as:

How can school students help make changes to their schools, particularly in relation to waste caused by food packaging in school canteens?

Louise Haigh spoke about the pride Sheffield people used to have in jobs based in Sheffield in steel and coal mining which had an impact around the world. Students then raised questions like:

Do you have any advice for how young people can get into green jobs in Sheffield?

What would you like to see King Edward VII School doing to move toward carbon zero? If you are interested in seeing answers to questions like these, contact Mr Johnston to get involved in the Eco-Committee.




Chinese Art Competition Winners

World Book Day





World Book Day Quiz Winners



Sheffield Crown Court Visit – Inspiring Youth Project

Report on the visit to the Crown Court on Friday 11 February 2022 by members of the Inspiring Youth Project, which is run throughout Sheffield by South Yorkshire Police. Four of our students were chosen for the visit because they had impressed the South Yorkshire Police Inspiring Youth Manager by their work on the project so far.

The students - Sabiha, Year 9, Ambriel, Year 8, Nell, Year 8, and Hannah Year 8 - were met in the foyer of the Crown Court and briefed on the activities they would experience throughout the day.

They were briefed on the etiquette of the court, which included turning off mobile phones, the address to be given to judges and other staff they would meet. They were also instructed on how to interact whilst other court cases, witnesses and court staff were going about their daily routine.

Once they entered the courtroom they were met and welcomed individually by the High Sheriff who thanked them for coming to the court that day and they were shown to a specific place in the court so they could gain maximum benefit from the experience.

The day started with an address by the High Sheriff, Mr Martin McKervey, who outlined his historical role and what it means today. He informed students of the specification of becoming High Sheriff and told them that anyone could be elected as High Sheriff. Each county in England and Wales has a High Sheriff and they are elected for one year. He told the students that each High Sheriff could elect an area of support throughout their term of service and his was young people and mental health.

He welcomed each of the students and hoped that they would enjoy the day.

During the day the students had a chance to chat to seven court judges, including the Head Judge for Sheffield, two barristers and a trainee barrister and the court usher. Most of these people gave their personal account of what had attracted them to enter the law profession. All came from very different ethnic and educational backgrounds. Some leaving school with A levels and going the traditional route to university, some leaving school with few qualifications and finding other routes into the profession.

Some found pupillages and mini pupillages which is the final stage of training to be a barrister. During this time, you put into practice everything you have learnt so far. Although you will be called to the Bar on passing the Bar course, pupillage is essential if you wish to practise; in this sense it is the equivalent of the trainee solicitor's training contract. Without completing this year, you will not secure tenancy (i.e. a permanent place) within a set of chambers.

Pupillage usually takes one year to complete, with the year divided into two six-month periods, known as 'sixes'. Each six is spent in a set of chambers (although a small number of places are available in companies and other institutions), under the guidance and supervision of a junior barrister of at least five years' experience – your pupil supervisor.

The Head Judge in the Sheffield Courts joined the group. He spoke light heartedly about his role. He went on to say that the doors are now wide open for anyone who wants a legal career if they work hard and have the determination to see it through. Another stated that he had rarely experienced racism within his training or education and that the opportunities were there for people from Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic communities.

If the opportunities were taken and the hard work was put into achieving the standards required, anything was possible.

The students had been in an adult environment for the whole of the experience. They conducted themselves in a professional manner throughout and asked appropriate questions when the time was allocated. They portrayed a professional image for themselves and the School and should be commended for this.

All of the judges and barristers complimented the students on their behaviour, their level of engagement and the quality of their questions. There was a joint feeling of being inspired by them, which makes doing our little bit so much better.

My experience at Sheffield Crown Court - Ambriel, Year 8

On 7th February I got picked to go to Crown Court by PC Bobby Dev. This was through the Inspiring Youth Project that I have been doing. On the 11th February I met the police officer at the court and the day began. I got to see and talk to the judges and the people in other departments. We had a tour of the court rooms and I was shown where all the people sit in an actual case. We were told how the court process works. The court is very secure and I had to walk through metal detectors and was checked (looked through my bag). It was an amazing experience, and I really enjoyed the day.





Intermediate Maths Challenge

One hundred and seventeen Year 9, 10 and 11 students took part in this year's Intermediate Maths Challenge run by the UK Mathematics Trust. The challenge consists of twenty-five multiple-choice questions, increasing in difficulty and is a great test of a student's ability to problem solve. While guessing is allowed, you will lose marks on the harder questions if your guess is incorrect.

Our students did exceptionally well with ten students achieving Gold, twenty eight achieving Silver and thirty two achieving Bronze Certificates. Thirteen students did well enough to qualify for the follow up rounds which are even more difficult.

Three Year 9 and eight Year 10 and 11 students made it through to the wonderfully named Grey (Year 9) and Pink (Year 10 and 11) Kangaroos which is a similar multiple-choice challenge.

Martin Jarvis (Year 9) and Artemis Vellacott (Year 11) did so well that they qualified for their respective Intermediate Mathematical Olympiads - challenges of immense difficulty where they have to produce solutions to six questions in the course of two hours, explaining their reasoning for their final answers.



Post 18 progression and widening participation

King Edward VII School works closely with the Widening Participation team at The University of Sheffield and our Post 16 students are involved with a number of projects:

Discover Programme

The programme is designed to give Post 16 students an experience of what it is like to be a student at The University of Sheffield. The programme is split into five subject and career pathways (Arts and Humanities and Social Sciences, Dental Professions, Law, STEM and Medicine) so that students can apply to the one that sounds the most exciting and the most interesting. This year we had twenty five successful applications to The Discover Programme.

Realising Opportunities

Realising Opportunities (RO) is a unique collaboration of leading, research-intensive universities, working together to promote fair access for those groups under-represented in higher education. Realising Opportunities is a two-year programme over Year 12 and 13. The structured and interactive programme helps Post 16 students develop their academic skills, improve their awareness of Higher Education and knowledge of how to apply to university. It also gives students increased access to the RO universities through events and activities. This year four of our Year 12 students joined the programme.

The University of Sheffield in Schools Mentoring

Students in Year 12 who have the academic potential to succeed in Higher Education and meet specific widening participation criteria are invited to apply to the mentoring scheme. Mentees meet their student mentor in school/college for regular weekly 1-1 mentoring sessions throughout the academic year and discuss themes such as study skills, exam preparation, course options and personal development. We have eleven Year 12 students being supported through this scheme this year.

Visit to The University of Sheffield

On Friday 25 February 2022 we took over three hundred of our Year 12 students on a visit to the University of Sheffield. They attended lectures about choosing a course at university, how to apply through UCAS and heard tips about writing a personal statement.

We were wowed by the architecture of the Diamond building and the facilities in the Students' Union. There were many conversations about progression plans and considering where to study next.

Oxbridge offers





Stephen Carley Exhibition

Art and King Edward VII Photography teacher, Stephen Carley, has just finished exhibiting in Sheffield at Bloc Projects. His work was shown alongside three other Sheffield artists in an exhibition called GEOMETRY AND GESTURE.

Process rooted the four of us. Whether it's paint, detritus collage, 35mm photographs, sound or film, it doesn't matter really. The



'curiosity' is contextualised as we see fit or feel appropriate or just want to see what might happen. I might be contradicted here (and I am totally fine with that), but drawing seems to have underpinned so much of the work in this exhibition. Drawing as a verb of course.

"Drawing is the primal means of communication, which predates and embraces writing and functions as a tool of conceptualisation parallel with language" — Deanna Petherbridge, The Primacy of drawing.

The show took some effort for sure. Curatorial wrangling, technical hacks, fast track graphic design solutions, screwdriver blisters, even press conversations on the 'phone walking in a gale! But the exhibition worked, it worked really well actually. There was conflict for sure and creative differences called to each other across the space. This was positive I think. But there was also commonality and linkage. Creative empathy.

I'm reminded at this point of a succinct quote from artist Robert Rauschenberg;

"People ask me, 'Don't you ever run out of ideas?' Well, in the first place, I don't use ideas. Every time I have an idea, it's too limiting and usually turns out to be a disappointment. But I haven't run out of curiosity."

There was a lot of debate about the exhibition.

Was the exhibition really about abstraction?

Or was it about Memories? Landscape? Design? Process? Materials?

For me? Well, it's really about tests. Always testing. What will this do? Can this go there? For me, making (Art) work is not about representation (even if a photograph has recognisable elements, an audio track has a vocal or a piece of film is probably sky or water). It's more a gathering and ordering of a collection of memories. Distant past and visceral recent. I am in a constant state of knowing and not knowing. Tests. Keep testing.



Old Edwardians and Young Edwardians

Ruben Tozer-Loft

Last year, former student Reuben Tozer-Loft applied for a Young Composers' Conference where there were more than one hundred applicants from across the world. Sixteen were successful, so it was a real honour to be involved. Here is his report!

"I spent a week in Appeldoorn, a quiet city in the Netherlands for the 28th Young Composers Meeting. Having been selected in November, I wrote a piece for the Orkest de Ereprijs, a large Sinfonietta with singers, called _Dénouemont_. It follows the clarinetist (based on Hercule Poirot) as he untangles a murder mystery!



Throughout the week I met fellow young composers from across the world, some from as far as Indonesia and New York. We had daily lessons and lectures from a variety of composers who work in the Netherlands, including Martijn Padding, Huba de Graaf, and Richard Ayres. Meanwhile, the Orkest rehearsed our fifteen pieces which were premiered and recorded in a concert on Friday. These ranged from huge, soundscapes with electronics, to a couple of miniature comedy operettas, to dense, industrial, heavy-metal influenced pieces.

It was a highly stimulating, and enjoyable week, that provided me with advice, contacts, and friends that I'm sure will support my composing in the future."
