Bridging Work for A-level English Literature

<u>Task:</u> Read a novel over the summer break. Pick something you do not usually read (eg. if you like reading contemporary fiction, challenge yourself and choose a Victorian novel). This will help to widen your knowledge and understanding of different types of narratives.

You then need to prepare a 10-minute presentation on the novel, drawing upon issues of narrative style and structure, and of context and criticism, as you will have discussed in the Taster Session. You should cover each area, and add any other details that you feel are relevant to the way your chosen text should be interpreted. You will present to your new class and teacher in September.

(NB - If you missed the Taster session and these sheets have been posted home to you, you DO need to do this homework, it will prepare you for the level and detail of the course. It is also what your teachers will begin with in September, so it is a necessary part of your future learning.)
